About the Singsås Inn

Kjelden

Kjelden var opprinnelig en skysstasjon. et hvile- og overnattingssted for reisende mellom Røros og Trondheim. Det flotte dekorerte langkammerset var soveplass for velstående reisende. Andre fikk soveplass på loftet, mens noen fant seg til rette i dagligstua som også var kjøkken og soverom for sjølfolket. Også bevertningen var avhengig av stand og betalingsevne.

Kjelden er ei Trønderlån - en slank, smal stuebygning med store vinduer som

gir gjennomlys i de to store stuene og langkammerset. Det er loft over det hele. Kjelden var leilendingsgård under Mustgodset og i 1845 ble gården frikjøpt av leilendingen Ole Pedersen, som sannsynligvis er den som har fått bygd stuelåna rett etter dette.

Gården Kjelden lå opprinnelig i Singsås i Midtre Gauldal, Sør-Trøndelag. Bygningen ble gjenreist på Sverresborg i 1951.

KJELDEN

Kjelden was originally a coaching inn, a place for resting and accommodation for those who traveled between Røros and Trondheim. The beautifully decorated long chamber was accommodation for wealthy travelers. Others got accommodation in the loft, while some found their place in the daily living room, which was also a kitchen and a bedroom for the master and the mistress of the house. The food and drinks served varied based on the travelers social status and the ability to pay.

residential building with large windows that provides light for the two large living rooms and the long chamber. The top floor is a loft. Kjelden was a peasant farm belonging to Mustgodset and in 1845 the farm was bought by the peasant Ole Pedersen. He was probably the one to build the long chamber.

The farm Kjelden was originally located in Singsås in Midtre Gauldal, Sør-Trøndelag. It was rebuilt at Sverresborg in 1951.












Buset is east of Støren. South of Buset is Budaltown, and further south is Maureggan farm.




"Dal" means "valley." The Bua ("bow") river flows through Budaland past the farm named Buseth.





Budal is both the name of the valley and the central town of the valley. It is south of the Buseth farm.



Christian's grandparents and greatgrandparents are likely to have lived here. It is south down the Budal, from the Buseth settlement, and noticeably higher in elevation.
